Additional governance issues:

 The charity operated under Memorandum of Understanding with Kent Refugee Action Network (KRAN), which allowed to use KRAN's bank account, provided bookkeeping support and safeguarding support.

- Restructuring of the charity into a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) started in March 2023 and resulted in registration of the CIO Canterbury for Ukraine by Charity Commission in September 2023.

Section C

Objectives and activities

Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

- 1. To provide relief from social and economic poverty to Ukrainian persons displaced as a result of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, which started in 2014 and intensified on 24 February 2022 ('Displaced Persons') and to help alleviate poverty among Displaced Persons in the UK and Ukraine.
- 2. To support <u>educational and social needs</u> of the Displaced Persons.
- 3. To facilitate <u>community development</u> which involves supporting the community of the Displaced Persons, their hosts and other community members involved with them.
- 4. To preserve and develop <u>Ukrainian culture</u> and promote opportunities for cultural exchange within the local community.

The above objects are achieved by the following activities:

Communication:

- Canterbury for Ukraine **Face Book group** (Objective 3) with more than 2200 active members (https://www.facebook.com/groups/canterbury.for.ukraine) is an information sharing platform for the local community. C4U volunteers provide administration to the group under the leadership by Oksana Styles;
- Web site www.Canterbutr4Ukraine.org (Objective 3) is used to share information about the C4U activities and was updated on a regularly by Maryna Samokysh, C4U Communication Officer;

Individual support:

• 'Welcome Hub' - a one-stop information and contact service for Ukrainians and host families (Objective 1). It provides weekly drop-in and thematic information workshops.

<u>Partners:</u> Kent Together, Diocese of Canterbury and Canterbury Umbrella Centre.

Results in 2023: 39 sessions were organised attended by on average 8 people. Main Areas of Support: Housing, Employment, Universal Credit claims, Utility Bills, Foodbank, Laptops, Small grants applications, issues with hosts, finding of new hosts. The topics of the workshops included: Employment (by DWP), School Education (by



KCC), Self-Employment (by DWP), Universal Credit (by DWP and Professor Peter Taylor Gooby, University of Kent), Modern Slavery (by The Clewer Initiative & DoC), Hate Crime/Community Safety (by Kent Police), NHS outreach (by Northgate Medical Practice). The Hub was implemented by a team of 2-3 support officers and representatives of the Canterbury City Council, DWP under leadership of Domenica Pecoraro;

- Home for Ukraine visa application support for local sponsors and Ukrainian refugees (Objective 1) at all stages including matching support. Demand for this support decreased in comparison to 2022 and is addressed primarily via the Welcome Hub;
- Bespoke advice and signposting for individuals, including translation and interpreting support, and advocacy to access welfare support and services (Objective 1). More than 100 people in the Canterbury District and East Kent have benefited in 2023;

Education and personal development:

• English language classes
(Objectives 2, 3) - two to three
English classes (6-8 hours) per
week and an opportunity to take
ESOL exams

Partner: Canterbury Christ Church University, KCC Adult Education Results in 2023: About 40 weeks of classes delivered with 70-80 regular attendees. Classes split



into 3–4 ability levels where learners achieved ESOL Skills for Life qualifications in Speaking & Listening, Reading, and Writing. In addition, "Work Skills and Employability" classes were held, with a focus on communication skills, applying for jobs, writing CVs etc., and included a visit from the National Careers' Service. Classes were delivered by a team of 4-5 teachers and volunteers under leadership of Dr. Kevin Balchin.

Additionally, a 50% fee waiver is offered by CCCU to displaced Ukrainians taking the CELTA course, which trains participants to work as English language teachers in particular settings. Two displaced Ukrainians from this course are now working for KCC at CCCU, teaching English to Ukrainians.

Beneficiary feedback from English classes:

"Our course was really helpful for us. Now I can understand more native speakers. I've made new English friends and feel more free to speak. Also, our lessons gave more confidence to get a job. And even to write a CV was easier after advice in our lessons."

• Bi-monthly Young Ukrainians Hub (YoU-Hub) (Objectives 2, 3) - is an educational and social centre for young Ukrainians in East Kent. Its goal is to encourage Ukrainian children and youth to maintain connection with their Ukrainian heritage by popularizing Ukrainian traditions, language and culture. It provides children and their parents with a safe place for social interactions within their native environment.
<u>Partner:</u> Simon Langton Grammar School for Girls with funding by the Kent County Department of Education




<u>Results in 2023:</u> 25 sessions (including 4 special events) attended on average by 38 children (age 5-17) with about 100 registered Ukrainian children – the total number of visits 943:

parents' club started in April 2023 (employability coaching, psychological support, fitness, hobbies, trainings) – 17 sessions (10 parents on average), total number of visits 171.

Special events:

- o 16/09/23 Ukrainian animated film screening "Mavka. The Forest Song" at the Vue Cinema in Ukrainian language – free for children and at a substantial discount for adults:
- 21/10/23 a trip to London, with tours to the British Library and the British Museum;
- 11/11/23 a virtual tour to the National Holodomor-Genocide Museum of Ukraine;
- 18/11/23 a tour to Canterbury Cathedral, attending a stained-glass master class, supported by Quakers of Canterbury.





The support doesn't end with the younger members. It's truly remarkable that there are separate activities for parents: networking, sewing, sports, lectures, and psychological support, among others.

A special note of appreciation goes to the YoU-Hub team for organising the nativity and the wonderful Christmas celebration."

(Objective 4) – weekly lessons for small groups of school children and adults from local community (delivered by Lada Russova)

Community building:

● Community events (Objectives 3 and 4)

— 4 main community events (the War
Anniversary on 24 February; Eurovision
in Canterbury, May 2023; Independence
Day, 24 August; Holodomor
Commemoration, November 2023) and
several smaller events were organised in
2023. The total number of participants
for main events was between 250 and
400 people including Ukrainian families,
local sponsors and supporters of

Ukraine. from Canterbury and East Kent. The primary purpose of these events was to demonstrate solidarity with Ukrainian people, to support local Ukrainian community, to celebrate Ukrainian culture and commemorate important events in Ukrainian history. The Lord Mayor of Canterbury, MPs and community leaders joined these events.

- Young at Hearts (Objectives 3) a social club for older age Ukrainians. The club is organised to prevent social isolation of older age displaced Ukrainians. Partner: Canterbury Umbrella Centre Results in 2023: The Club was organised in May 2023 and includes about 20 members. During 2023, the Club had 53 weekly meetings including workshops (e.g. Memory disorders: causes, treatment) and tours to museums and neighbouring cities and attending public events. The club members took an active role as volunteers at the C4U public events. The Club lead is Volodymyr Nizalov.
- Liaison with local government, charitable organisations, and businesses on behalf of the Ukrainian community (Objectives 3) to improve access to local support and services. C4U trustees are actively involved with representation of the Ukrainian community of the Canterbury District and East Kent at various meetings, local and national events. For example, C4U representatives attend regular Network meetings of local government authorities in support of the Home for Ukraine scheme. They also represent the Ukrainian community at the Ethnic Minority in Canterbury (EMIC) meetings and meetings of the Independent Advisory Group (IAG) to Kent Police.

Cultural development:

• Canterbury Ukrainian Ladies
Choir (Objectives 3, 4) was
organised in August 2022 and
targets several objectives: to
provide psychological support to
displaced Ukrainian women and
prevent social isolation, to celebrate
Ukrainian culture and share it with
the local community, to fundraise
for the needs of Ukrainian
community in East Kent and for




humanitarian needs in Ukraine. As such, the Choir offers a healing space for women

through singing, helping members form friendships and support circles The Choir has about 30 participants and operates under the leadership by Joanna Chapman and Olena Nizalova Results in 2023: The Choir had weekly rehearsals, had 7 concerts and contributed to the C4U public events, and fundraising efforts.

Ukrainian book collection and Discussion Club (Objectives 4)

Partner: Beaney Library
Results in 2023: C4U donated about 150 books of modern Ukrainian literature and books about
Ukraine which were added to the Library catalogue and made available to readers around Kent County through the library loan system. Regular sessions of the Discussion Club are organised by Lada Russova.



Help to Ukraine:

- Books for Brave Kids (Objectives 2) collection of English books for schools in Ukraine was organised by Tamila Senko, Lada Russova and Hanna Hrekova. There were 21 boxes with books collected and delivered to 6 schools and one shelter "Misto Dobra".
 - Fundraising and donation for humanitarian projects in Ukraine (Objectives 1)
 Partner: Ukraine Charity,
 London
 Results in 2023: a fundraising concert was organised in Canterbury by Anastasiya
 Nizalova and C4U Ladies
 Choir in February, 2023.



£1,426 was raised and donated to "Misto Dobra" (City of Kindness), which provides shelter to displaced mothers and children, three orphanages from the Southern Ukraine and victims of domestic abuse. The donation was used to build a playground for young children from the internally displaced families staying at the shelter. A second fundraising event "Borscht Party" was organised under the leadership by Olena Nizalova and active contribution by C4U trustees and student volunteers from the University of Kent about £1,000 was raised for the projects in Ukraine, which will be implemented in 2024.

Achievements and performance

Summ ary of the main achiev ements of the charity during the year

The year of 2023 was a transformative year for Canterbury for Ukraine. While C4U started as an emergency response community group managed by a small group of local volunteers, in 2023 it became an organisation with hired administrative and communication support, systematic fundraising activities and well-established set of activities. We have managed to stay relevant to the needs of our local community of displaced Ukrainian people and deliver high quality services and activities as described above.

C4U and people collaborating closely with our organisation received recognition at the local and national levels:

- July, 2023 C4U was recognised as the Community and Outreach Project of the year by the Canterbury Christ Church University Business and Community Impact Award;
- November, 2023 Canterbury City Council Homes for Ukraine Team won the annual award for outstanding collaboration with the community;
- November, 2023 Cllr. Connie Nolan, Trustee of C4U, became a winner of the national Local Government Information Unit (LGIU) award for resilience for her work with the Ukrainian community.



C4U was able to mobilise core and project specific funds from the following sources:

- C4U Fundraising Dinner;
- Refugee Council;
- Kent Department of Education;
- Kent Canterbury Community Foundation/ Masonic Charitable Foundation;
- Canterbury City Council;
- donations during the Choir concerts and community events;
- donations by parents of the YoU-Hub children;
- donations by people of Canterbury.

The funding allowed contracting of the Link Officer (Welcome Hub), Administrative and Communication officers to strengthen C4U administration.
